Deaths due to Sudden Cardiac Arrest:

Nationally: 325,000

Metro Area: 1, 112

Survival rates:

Omaha metro area: 5-10%

Seattle, WA metro area: 45%

Training and AED access make all the difference!

Raising the survival rate in the metro area to 50% would save 444 lives each year!

Without oxygen, brain damage begins in about 4 minutes; death occurs in about 10 minutes.

In a cardiac emergency, for every minute that defibrillation is delayed, the victim's chance of survival decreases by 10%.

The average EMS response time from when you call until EMS is ready to take control of the scene is between 5 and 10 minutes.

The Chain of Survival:

Early Access – Call 911

Early CPR

Early Defibrillation

Early Advanced Care – EMS/Hospital

Nearly every state has enacted a Good Samaritan statute designed to promote humanitarian rescue acts by protecting rescuers from liability. The two common requirements:

1. Rescue act must be voluntary
2. Assistance rendered must be performed in good faith

Citizen CPR is a new national ARC program. The initiative began in January to train 5 million people in 2011. It's easy to learn, there is no mouth to mouth contact and it is appropriate for all ages.

The Goal is increased community preparedness – Train more people... Save more lives.
